### RAJASTHAN 🙀



Mahi Banswara Rajasthan Atomic Power Project (MBRAPP)



On September 25, 2025, Prime Minister Narendra Modi laid the foundation stone for the Mahi Banswara Rajasthan Atomic Power Project (MBRAPP) in Banswara.



#### **Key Points:**

- **Location:** On the banks of the Mahi River in Banswara.
- Reactors: The project will install four nuclear reactors (700 x 4) with a capacity of 700 MW each.
- Power generation at this plant is expected to begin in 2033.
- **Initial cost: ₹42,000 crore.**
- **Type:** Pressurized heavy water reactor (PHWR)





- Fuel: Natural uranium.
- **Coolant: Moderator, Heavy Water (D20)**
- **Company:** Anushakti Vidyut Nigam Limited (Ashwini)
- This will be the 9th nuclear reactor to be installed in the country.

**Other Important Points:** 

- On May 9, 2025, the Atomic Energy Regulatory Board (AERB) issued consent for the siting of the Mahi Banswara Rajasthan Atomic Power Project (MBRAPP-1-4).
- According to the AERB, the proposed site is suitable for the construction and operation of a nuclear power plant.
- The Government of India and the Nuclear Power Corporation of India Limited (NPCIL) have already initiated plans for this project.
- This will be Rajasthan's second nuclear site to be established in Banswara.
- Rajasthan's first nuclear project: Rajasthan Atomic Power Project (RAPP) Rawatbhata, Chittorgarh.
- PHWR: A Pressurized Heavy Water Reactor (PHWR) is a type of nuclear power reactor that uses heavy water (deuterium oxide/D2O) as a coolant and neutron moderator and natural uranium as fuel.
- Nodal agency for production, maintenance and monitoring of nuclear power in India: Nuclear Power Corporation of India Limited (NPCIL)

#### Isarda Dam – Sawai Madhopur

#### Why in News?

■ Recently, the first phase of the Isarda Dam (Sawai Madhopur) was inaugurated by Prime Minister Narendra Modi.



### **Key Points:**

- This dam is being constructed on the Banas River near Isarda (Sawai Madhopur).
- Isarda Dam is important for the drinking water supply of Sawai Madhopur and Dausa districts.
- Its construction is scheduled to be carried out in two phases. In the first phase, the dam will be completed to its full fill level of RL 262 meters (filling capacity of 10.77 TMC).
- Water storage is limited to RL 256 meters (filling capacity of 3.24 TMC).
- In the second phase, the dam will be able to store water up to its full fill capacity of RL 262 meters.
- The revised administrative and financial approval for the first phase of the project is ₹1038.65 crore.





- This project will not only address the water crisis but also ensure efficient management of surplus water from the Bisalpur Dam and rainwater from the Banas River.
- Additionally, the Isarda Dam will supply drinking water to the Ramgarh Dam, Buchara, Chitoli, etc. dams under the Ram Jal Setu Link Project (Revised PKC-ERCP Link Project).

#### Status of Urban Bodies in Rajasthan

#### Why in News?

Recently, the state government approved a proposal to create one municipal corporation each in Jaipur, Jodhpur, and Kota, instead of the two existing municipal corporations.

### **Key Points:**

- According to this decision, these cities will now have one mayor each, and the number of wards will also be reduced.
- Following this government decision, the state will have 309 urban bodies instead of 312.
- This decision will result in the Jaipur Municipal Corporation having 150 wards. Jaipur Greater and Heritage will cease to exist in the upcoming elections. Jodhpur and Kota will have one municipal corporation each, instead of two, with 100 wards each.

Facts for Prelims (Economic Survey – 2024-25):

**Development Authorities and Urban Trusts:** 

- The state government has established development authorities, urban trusts, Rajasthan Housing Board, Town Planning Office, Jaipur Metro Rail Corporation, etc. to meet the basic needs of the urban population in a systematic and coordinated manner.
- Seven development authorities (Jaipur, Ajmer, Jodhpur, Kota, Bharatpur, Bikaner, and Udaipur) and 10 urban trusts (Alwar, Abu, Barmer, Bhilwara, Chittorgarh, Jaisalmer, Pali, Sriganganagar, Sikar, and Sawai Madhopur) are functioning in the state for the convenience of citizens.





■ Smart Cities: Four cities in Rajasthan – Jaipur, Udaipur, Kota, and Ajmer – have been selected for development as smart cities.

Deendayal Antyodaya Yojana-National Urban Livelihoods Mission (DAYN-ULM)

■ This mission is being effectively implemented in 213 urban local bodies of Rajasthan.







Raju Mangodiwala - Overseas Coordinator for Telangana and Odisha States

#### Why in News?

Recently, businessman Raju Mangodiwala was nominated by the Rajasthan Foundation as Overseas Coordinator for the states of Telangana and Odisha.

### **Key Points:**

- The Rajasthan Foundation aims to connect with diaspora Rajasthanis in India and abroad and encourage their participation in the state's development.
- It provides a platform for diaspora Rajasthanis to contribute to the state's socio-economic development.
- The Rajasthan Foundation has established branches in 12 cities in India, including Chennai, Coimbatore, Kolkata, Surat, Mumbai, Bengaluru, Ahmedabad, Hyderabad, Indore, and abroad, including London (UK), New York (USA), and Kathmandu (Nepal).
- Additionally, approval has been granted to open chapters of the Rajasthan Foundation in Dubai (UAE), Munich (Germany), Riyadh (Saudi Arabia), Tokyo (Japan), Singapore, Melbourne (Australia), Nairobi (Kenya), Kampala (Uganda), and Doha (Qatar).





#### **Subansiri River:**


- Origin: Tibet. It is the largest tributary of the Brahmaputra. It is a trans-Himalayan antecedent river.

- **Type:** It is a type of stratovolcano, part of the Andaman volcanic arc.









**High-Level Meeting of Global South Countries: New York** 

#### Why in News?

■ On September 24, 2025, External Affairs Minister Dr. S. Jaishankar hosted a high-level meeting of Global South countries in New York on the sidelines of the 80th United Nations General Assembly session.





#### **Key Points:**

#### **Global South:**

■ The term Global South was first coined by political activist Carl Oglesby in 1969.



Date : 25 September, 2025

- The Global South refers to countries often referred to as developing, less developed, or underdeveloped, primarily located in Africa, Asia, and Latin America.
- These countries typically experience higher levels of poverty, income inequality, and challenging living conditions compared to the wealthier countries of the Global North.
- Developing countries were previously commonly referred to as the "Third World," a term coined by Alfred Sauvy in 1952.

**India's Initiatives for the Global South:** 

- At the "Voice of the Global South Summit" hosted by India in January 2023, the Indian Prime Minister announced five initiatives to support the development of other developing countries.
- 1. "Global South Centre of Excellence": For research on development solutions and best practices.
- 2. "Global South Science and Technology Initiative": To share Indian expertise in areas such as space technology and nuclear energy.
- 3. "Arogya Maitri" Project: To provide essential medical supplies to any developing country affected by natural disasters or humanitarian crises.
- 4. "Global South Young Diplomats Forum": To provide a platform for young officials from foreign ministries.
- 5. "Global South Scholarships": To provide higher education opportunities in India to students from developing countries.

#### **US H-1B Visa Fees: Opportunities for India**

#### Why in News?

The US move to increase H-1B visa fees emphasizes the need for India to strengthen its domestic innovation and technology ecosystem.

#### **Key Points:**

**Opportunities for India** 

Preventing brain drain: India has STEM graduates and young professionals who can contribute to innovation and technological development within the country.

STEM: Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics.

- Start-up ecosystem: India is the third largest start-up hub in the world. Unicorn companies in fintech, ed-tech, and health-tech in India can benefit.
- Policy support: Government initiatives such as 'Start-up India,' 'Digital India,' 'Make in India,' and the 'Atal Innovation Mission' are being implemented to promote entrepreneurship and innovation.
- Low cost and market advantage: Low operating costs and a large domestic consumer base attract talent and investment.
- **Emerging Technologies:** Growing investment in sectors like AI offers India the opportunity to become the "Asian Silicon Valley." **Challenges for India**
- Research and Development (R&D) and Skills: Only 0.7% of GDP is spent on research in India.
- Infrastructure and Regulation: Inadequate infrastructure and complex regulatory frameworks slow technological progress.
- Intellectual Property Rights (IPR) and Commercialization: Weak intellectual property protection and limited ability to transform research results into global products pose a major challenge.
- Regional Cooperation: Political tensions and regulatory differences hinder collaborative technology initiatives in South Asia.

**Tamil Nadu Coastal Restoration Mission (TN-SHORE)** 



#### **Key Points:**

- TN-SHORE, approved in September 2025, is an ambitious ₹1,675 crore project.
- The project will be funded by the World Bank. It aims to strengthen Tamil Nadu's coastal economy and enhance its natural resilience.
- The main component of TN-SHORE is the restoration and plantation of mangroves across 1,000 hectares.
- The World Bank funding will be disbursed directly to village-level mangrove councils, which will comprise local people.
- In addition to mangroves, the initiative also aims to restore 30,000 hectares of marine area and protect endangered species such as dugongs and turtles.

#### **Mangroves in India**


- According to the India State of Forest Report 2023 (ISFR-2023), the total mangrove area in the country is 4,991.68 square kilometers.
- Between 2001 and 2023, India recorded a net increase of 11.4% in mangrove area.
- West Bengal has the largest number of mangroves in India, followed by Gujarat.

Ayushman Bharat: Pradhan Mantri Jan Arogya Yojana completes 7 years





#### **Key Points:**

- Largest publicly funded health insurance scheme.
- Union Cabinet approved health cover for senior citizens under the Ayushman Bharat Pradhan Mantri Jan Arogya Yojana (AB PM-JAY).
- Launch: Launched in 2018, Ayushman Bharat is a flagship program of the Government of India, in line with the recommendations of the National Health Policy 2017 to realize the vision of universal health coverage (UHC).
- Former name: The scheme was formerly known as the National Health Protection Scheme (NHPS).
- Ministry: Ministry of Health and Family Welfare.
- **Type:** Centrally sponsored scheme under the Ayushman Bharat Mission.





- Objective: This initiative is aligned with the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), which aim to improve healthcare access at the primary, secondary, and tertiary levels through a comprehensive, continuum-of-care approach.
- Target: 120 million families (approximately 550 million beneficiaries), prioritizing the poorest 40% of the population.
- **■** Financing: Fully funded by the government.
- Financial sharing: The central and state share is 60:40 (90:10 for the north eastern states and two Himalayan states (Himachal Pradesh and Uttarakhand) and Jammu and Kashmir).
- Eligibility criteria: All senior citizens aged 70 years or above, regardless of income.
- Implementing agencies: The National Health Authority (NHA) is an autonomous body chaired by the Union Minister of Health and Family Welfare.
- State: The State HA is headed by a CEO appointed by the state government.
- **District:** District Implementation Unit (DIU) headed by the District Collector.
- Beneficiaries: Identified through the Socio-Economic Caste Census-2011 (SECC-2011).

**Key Components:** 

Ayushman Arogya Mandir (AAM)

- Provides a wide range of health services including preventive, promotive, rehabilitative, and curative care.
- Envisions offering services including maternal and child healthcare, care for non-communicable diseases, palliative and rehabilitative care, oral, eye, and ENT care, mental health, etc.



### **Startup Conclave 2025**



Why in News?

On September 23, 2025, the Union Minister of Home Affairs and Minister of Cooperation inaugurated the Startup Conclave 2025 in Gandhinagar, Gujarat.

**Key Points:** 

**Highlights of the Conclave:** 

The conclave was organized around the three mantras of innovate, elevate, and accelerate.





#### **India's Startup Ecosystem:**

- India's Global Position: In the eight years since the launch of 'Startup India' (2016), India has become the third largest startup ecosystem in the world.
- India's ranking in the Innovation Index in 2025 is 38th, and in the last ten years, India has also become the third largest digital ecosystem in the world.
- Role of women: 48% of the country's startups are founded by women, with 900 women-led startups in the Northeast.
- Employment: The startup ecosystem has provided permanent employment to 1.79 million people so far.
- Number of startups in India: Increased from 500 startups and 4 unicorns in 2014 to 192,000 startups and over 120 unicorns with a value of over \$350 billion in 2025.
- **Domestic situation:** Gujarat is among the top 5 states in the country with 16,000 startups, and Ahmedabad is among the top 4 cities with 6,650 startups.
- Government's efforts: Fund of ₹ 10 thousand crore, Startup India Seed Fund of ₹ 945 crore corpus, maximum loan limit increased from ₹ 10 crore to ₹ 20 crore, decided to give up to ₹ 20 lakh for proof of concept, approved funding of ₹ 50 lakh for prototype development and reduced GST to zero tax on income up to ₹ 12 lakh.





- Organized by the Department for Promotion of Industry and Internal Trade, Startup India's primary objective is to eliminate certain restrictive state government policies, including:
  - o License Raj
  - Land Permissions
  - Foreign Investment Proposals
  - Environmental Clearances

#### **Key Points:**

- **National Vision:** Promote inclusive, citizen-centric, and transparent governance, emphasizing minimum government, maximum governance.
- Technology-driven Governance: Provide multilingual, real-time, and sectorspecific citizen services by adopting AI, ML, blockchain, GIS, IoT, and data analytics. It emphasizes the need for ethical and transparency. Examples: Digital India Bhashini, Digi Yatra, NADRES V2, etc.
- Expansion of successful models: Focus on nationwide expansion of models such as SAMPADA/Sampada 2.0 (Madhya Pradesh), e-Khata (Bengaluru), Rohini Gram Panchayat (Maharashtra), NHAI's Drone Analytics Monitoring System (DAMS), etc.
- **Grassroots and Inclusive Development:** 
  - o Geographical reach: Expanding reach to areas with connectivity issues, such as the Northeast and Ladakh, under the National e-Governance Service Delivery Assessment (NeSDA) framework.
  - o Expansion of successful Panchayat digital models across the country, launching digital literacy programs targeting women and youth, etc.
- Cybersecurity and Sustainability: Implement technologies such as zero trust architecture, post-quantum security, and AI-based surveillance in priority sectors such as transportation, defense, and citizen service platforms.
- Agriculture and Sustainability: Providing farmers with better credit, advisory, and market access through the National Agri Stack.

# Solar PV Potential Assessment (Ground-Mounted) Report

### Why in News?

This report was released by the National Institute of Solar Energy (NISE) under the Ministry of New and Renewable Energy. It provides a policy-based and investment framework to guide project siting, infrastructure development, and increasing private sector participation.

#### **Kev Points:**

The report aims to fulfill India's Panchamrit commitments, achieving energy self-sufficiency by 2047 and net-zero emissions by 2070.

**Key Points of the Report:** 

- New assessment of national solar potential: While the potential was estimated at 749 GWp in 2014, it has now increased to approximately 3,343 GWp.
- Geographical distribution: Rajasthan and Maharashtra have the highest solar potential.
- Approximately 6.69% of the identified barren land in the country can be used for solar energy generation.

Key challenges in fully realizing India's solar energy potential

- Land acquisition: Setting up large-scale solar parks requires significant land. For example, conflicts over grazing lands and biodiversity-rich desert ecosystems in Rajasthan and Gujarat.
- Grid integration: The lack of affordable energy storage technologies makes it difficult to effectively integrate weather-dependent solar power into the grid.
- High initial costs: Despite low module prices, the initial cost of setting up projects is high.
- Others: Financial pressure on power distribution companies (DISCOMs), dependence on imports for solar modules (about 80% imported from China), policy and regulatory uncertainty, and a lack of a skilled workforce.

  Anandkumar Velkumar won the

  - champion, just a few days after winning gold in the 1000 meters with a record time of 1:24.92 and bronze in the 500-meter sprint.

- He also won a bronze medal at the World Games in early 2025.
