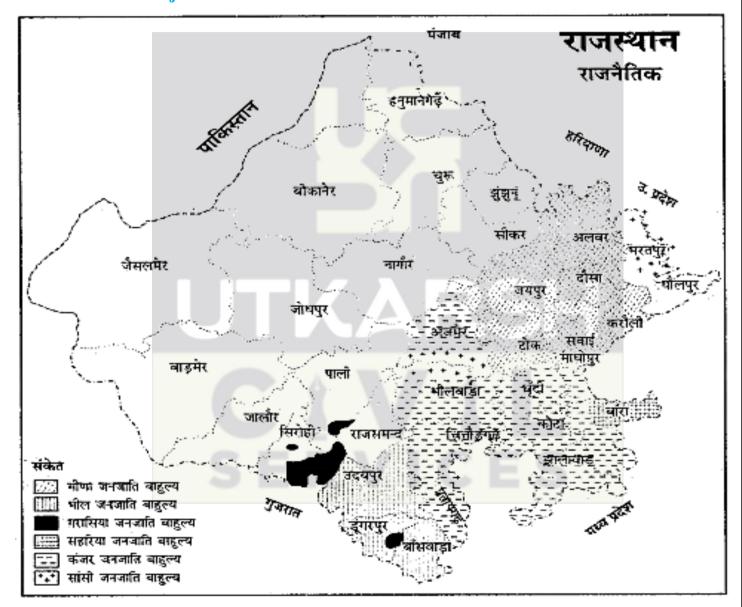

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Rajasthan Prohibition of Unlawful Conversion of Religion Bill, 2025

Why in News?

■ On September 9, 2025, the Rajasthan Prohibition of Unlawful Conversion of Religion Bill, 2025 was passed by voice vote in the Rajasthan Legislative Assembly.



Key Points:

■ Objective: To curb the conversion of any person by any person or institution through fraud, force or undue influence.

Provisions:

- 1. The properties which have been used for forced conversion can be confiscated.
- 2. Marriage done for the purpose of unlawful conversion of religion can be annulled by the Family Court or other competent court prescribed in this bill.
- 3. Under the new bill, the person converting religion will have to give information about converting religion voluntarily and without any pressure before the District Magistrate or Additional District Magistrate authorized by him 90 days in advance. In case of not doing so, a minimum of 7 to 10 years imprisonment and a minimum fine of Rs 3 lakh will be imposed.

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4. The religious leader who converts the religion will have to give a notice of conversion to the District Magistrate or an officer authorized by him 2 months in advance. In case of violation, a minimum of 10 to 14 years of imprisonment and a minimum fine of ₹ 5 lakh will be imposed.

- Note: Huge reserves of uranium were discovered in an area of 1086.46 hectares in Rohil of Khandela tehsil of Sikar district.

- Uranium: Uranium is a precious rare mineral for nuclear energy.
- Uses: Used in various fields including electricity, medicine, defence equipments, photography etc.
- Highest production of Uranium in the World: Kazakhstan, Canada and Australia.
- Uranium reserves in India: Uranium is obtained from Singhbhum of Bihar and Dharwad and Archaean rocks of Rajasthan, pegmatite rocks in North Bihar, Nellore of Andhra Pradesh, mica areas of Rajasthan, monazite deposits in coastal areas of Kerala, rocks of Kullu and Chamoli districts of Himachal Pradesh.

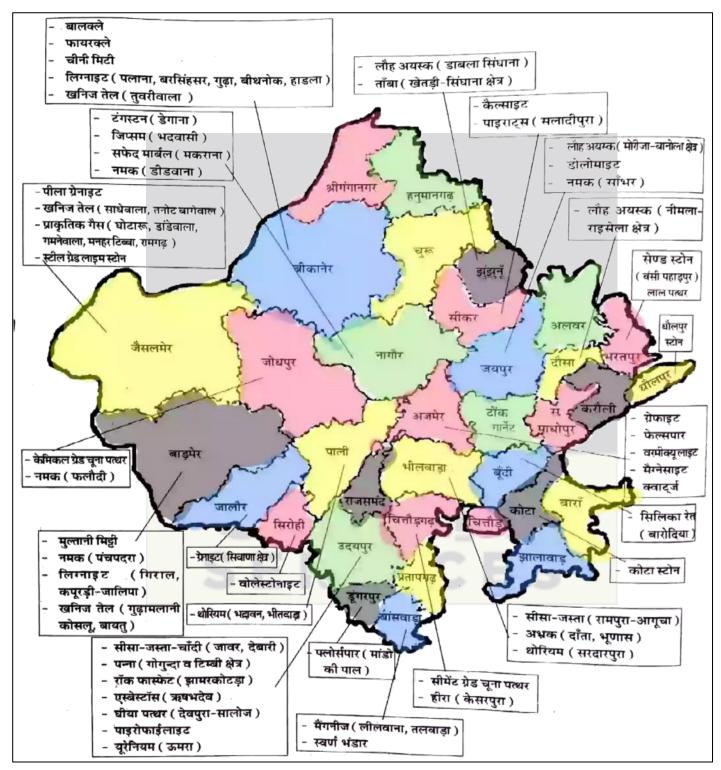

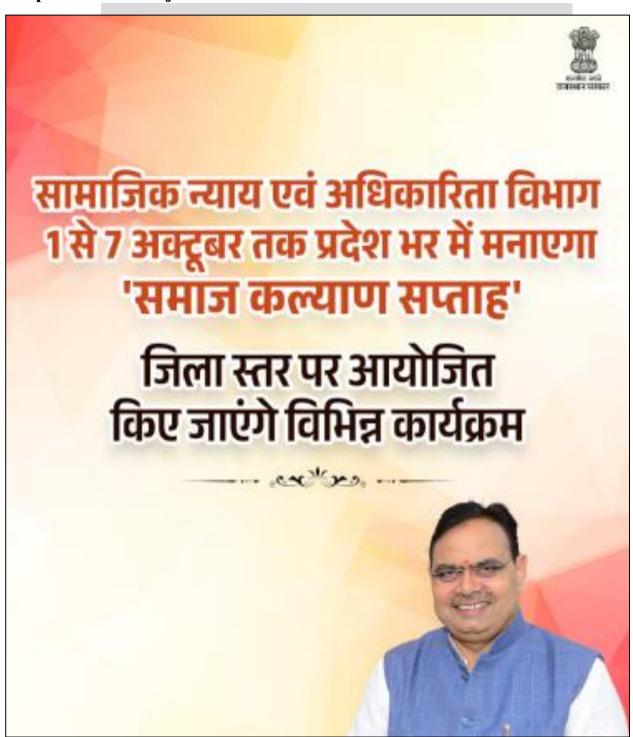

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Maa Voucher Scheme

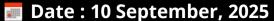
Why in News?

■ During the assembly session on September 9, 2025, Deputy Chief Minister Dr. Premchand Bairwa shared information regarding the Maa Voucher Scheme operated in the state in the assembly.



Key Points:

- Under the Maa Voucher Scheme operated in the state, vouchers are issued to pregnant mothers of the second and third trimester if government sonography test is not available.
- Through QR code generated vouchers, pregnant women are given the facility of free sonography at private sonography centers.
- Under this scheme, 1 thousand 363 private sonography centers of the state have been authorized. These private centers are paid directly into the bank account by the state government.
- There is no provision to provide sonography machines in government medical institutions under the Maa Voucher Scheme.





Assembly Constituency Sojat:

- Under the Maa Voucher Scheme, 583 sonographies have been done at 5 authorized private sonography centers from 17 September 2024 to 04 September 2025 in Sojat (Pali) Assembly Constituency.
- Among the hospitals operating in Sojat Assembly Constituency, only District Hospital Sojat has a sonography machine available and functional and CT scan machine is operated on PPP mode.
- There is no provision of these machines in other government institutions like Community Health Centers and Primary Health Centers.

Other Important Points:

Maa Voucher Scheme:

- Announcement: In Budget 2024-25
- Launched in: Entire state on 17 September 2024.
- Objective: To expand sonography facility for pregnant women in the state.
- Nodal Department: Medical, Health and Family Welfare Department, Government of Rajasthan.
- **Benefits:** Under the scheme, pregnant women are issued vouchers for free sonography in the second and third trimesters which are valid for 30 days from the date of issue.
- In case the voucher is not used during this period due to any reason, the woman can go to a medical institution and get the validity period extended for another 30 days.

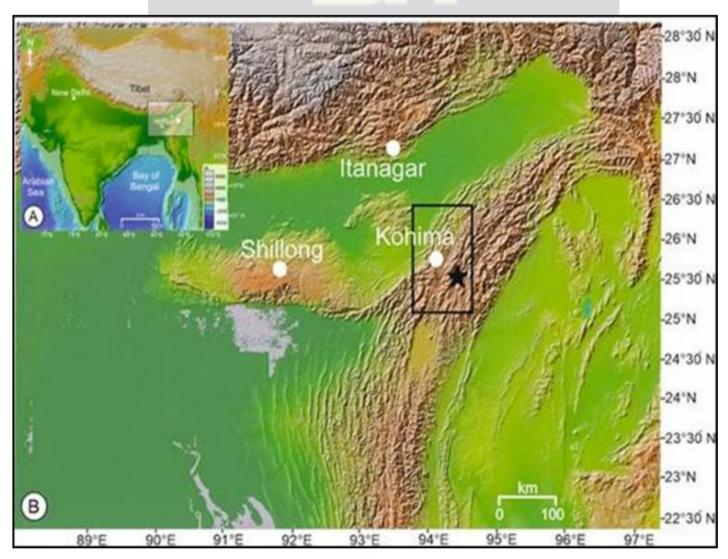


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Fossils found from Nagaland

- Why in News?
- Recent studies have established a link between the formation of Antarctica about 34 million years ago and the early development of the Indian monsoon system.
- The study is based on 34 million year old preserved fossil leaves obtained from the Laisong structure in Nagaland, which showed that the region once had a warm and humid climate.

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Key Points:

Research and Findings:

- By studying the fossil leaves, scientists from Birbal Sahni Institute of Palaeosciences (Lucknow) and Wadia Institute of Himalayan Geology (Dehradun), autonomous institutes of the Department of Science and Technology (DST), reconstructed the climate.
- They found that at that time vast ice sheets began to form in Antarctica, which led to changes in global wind and rainfall patterns. This led to intense monsoon rains in northeastern India and the development of the Indian monsoon system.

Sign of Modern Climate Change:

- The shift of the ITCZ (Intertropical Convergence Zone), which is the major rain belt, from the South Pole towards the tropics, causing India to experience exceptionally more rainfall and warmer temperatures.
- The study suggests that the melting of Antarctica's ice had a profound impact on the Indian monsoon, leading to significant changes in India's climate and rainfall system.

Current Impacts of Climate Change:

The study comes as an important warning about today's climate change.

Melting of Antarctica's ice may shift the ITCZ again, affecting rainfall patterns in the tropics.

Importance for the Future:

- The study suggests that Earth's climate works like a global network. Changes in one part of the Earth affect the entire world, be it the icy region of Antarctica or the moist forests of Nagaland.
- This study offers insight into how our planet responded to changes millions of years ago, and can help us better prepare for rising temperatures in the future.

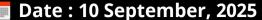

Launch of UPI-UPU Integration:

- Union Communications Minister Jyotiraditya Scindia launched the UPI-UPU Integration at the 28th Universal Postal Congress in Dubai.
- The project has been developed by the Department of Posts (DoP), NPCI International Payments Limited (NIPL) and Universal Postal Union (UPU). Integration of UPI and UPU:
- The initiative connects India's Unified Payments Interface (UPI) with the UPU Interconnection Platform (IP), combining the reach of the postal network with the speed and affordability of UPI.
- This will enable cross-border remittances to be made in a cost-effective manner, which will not only be fast but also secure.

Key Points:

Election Context: The election सीपी राधा took place after the previous
Vice President Jagdeep
Dhankhar resigned due to health reasons.



- Candidate: The National Democratic Alliance (NDA) nominated CP Radhakrishnan, while the opposition India Bloc nominated former Supreme Court judge B. Sudershan Reddy.
- Result: Radhakrishnan emerged victorious with 452 votes, while Reddy got 300 votes.

Constitutional Provisions

- **Article 63:** Establishes the office of Vice President of India.
- Article 64: Declares the Vice President as the ex-officio Chairman of the Rajya Sabha (Council of States).
- Article 65: Outlines the role of the Vice President in acting as President or discharging his functions in the event of a vacancy.
- Article 66: Specifies the election procedure for the Vice President.

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Eligibility Criteria (Article 66)

- **■** Citizen of India.
- Must have completed the age of 35 years.
- Must be eligible to be elected as a member of the Rajya Sabha.
- Not hold any office of profit under the Union, a State or any local or public authority.

Election Process (Article 66)

- Electoral College: The Vice President is elected by an electoral college consisting of members of both the Lok Sabha and the Rajya Sabha, including nominated members. State Legislative Assemblies do not participate.
- Candidates are required to have their nomination papers supported by at least
 20 electors as proposers and 20 electors as seconders.
- Proportional Representation: The election uses the system of proportional representation through the single transferable vote.
- Secret Ballot: Voting is done by secret ballot.
- Conduct: The Election Commission of India oversees the election and appoints a returning officer.

Powers and Functions

- Chairman of Rajya Sabha: As ex-officio Chairman, the Vice President presides over the proceedings of the Rajya Sabha.
- Acting President: If the office of the President falls vacant due to death, resignation, removal or any other cause, the Vice President discharges the duties of the President. He can act as President for a maximum of six months, during which the election of a new President is necessary.
- **Emoluments:** While acting as President, the Vice President receives the salary, allowances and privileges of the President.

Joint Military Exercise 'Zapad 2025'

Why in News?

The multilateral military exercise led by Russia and Belarus is scheduled for September 10-16, 2025. Several countries including a contingent of Indian Armed Forces are participating in the exercise.
