

8 districts of Rajasthan included in the Pradhan Mantri Dhan: Dhanya Krishi Yojana

- Why in News?
- Eight districts of Rajasthan, out of a total of 100 districts in the country, have been included under the recently launched Pradhan Mantri Dhan - Dhanya Krishi Yojana by the central government.





Key Points:

The eight districts include: Barmer, Jaisalmer, Nagaur, Jodhpur, Bikaner, Pali, Jalore, and Churu.





- The main criteria for selecting these districts are low productivity, medium cropping intensity, and below-average credit availability.
- It is noteworthy that the Prime Minister launched the nationwide Pradhan Mantri Dhan:Dhanya Krishi Yojana and the Mission for Aatmanirbharta in Pulseson October 11, 2025, from the Indian Council of Agricultural Research (ICAR) in New Delhi.
- The main objective of this scheme is to increase agricultural productivity, promote crop diversification, improve irrigation facilities, increase storage capacity, and provide easy access to credit to farmers. Eleven departments, including agriculture, animal husbandry, dairy, fisheries, cooperatives, food processing, rural development, and water resources, have been integrated.
- State-level program: Institute of Agricultural Management, Durgapura (Jaipur).

Mukhyamantri Ayushman Arogya Yojana (Progress so far)

Why in News?

■ Under the Chief Minister Ayushman Arogya (MAA) Yojana (Former name Chief Minister Chiranjeevi Health Insurance Scheme), launched by the Rajasthan government on February 19, 2024, cashless treatment has been provided to approximately 5 million critically ill patients by October 2025.

Key Points:

■ Currently, 13.4 million families are registered under scheme. The state government has added 132 new packages to the scheme announced in the budget for the financial year 2025-26.

Mukhyamantri Ayushman Arogya Yojana:

- Launched on: May 1, 2021
- Former name: Chief Minister Chiranjeevi Health Insurance Scheme (Chief Minister Ayushman Arogya Yojana from February 19, 2024)
- Objective: To provide cashless treatment for medical services in government and private empanelled hospitals.
- Beneficiaries: Free treatment for NFSA/SECC/Small and Marginal Farmers/Contract Workers/COVID/Anugrah Scheme/EWS/Senior Citizens (above 70 years of age).
- The remaining population is covered by the scheme by paying an annual premium of ₹850 per family and the remaining premium (₹1115) will be paid by the State Government.

Insurance Mode: ₹5 lakh.

Trust Mode: ₹20 lakh.

- Organ Transplant and Cochlear Implant Special Packages are also included, and reimbursement options are available in other states.
- The scheme covers a total of 1819 treatment packages.
- **Insurance Mode: 1761 packages.**
- Trust Mode: 58 packages.
- Expenses for 5 days before and 15 days after hospitalization are included.
- According to the Budget Announcement 2024, 73 days of cancer treatment are included in the Cancer Package Scheme.
- With this, the state has become the only state to provide free universal health care.

MAA Fund (announced in the State Budget for the financial year 2025-26 with an amount of ₹3500 crore):

- ₹3500 crore for free tests and medicines.
- Note: Under this scheme, organ transplant treatment is available free of cost in the state, whereas in other states, organ transplant expenses are reimbursed up to the package limit, and air travel tickets are also reimbursed for the patient and one family member.
- Under the scheme, eligible patients from outside the state are also being treated in the state and action is underway on outbound portability to provide treatment in other states.

Water Conservation: Public Participation: Public Movement Program: Mandrela (Jhunjhunu)

Why in News?

■ Recently, the "Water Conservation:
Public Participation: Public Movement
Program" was organized in Mandrela,
Jhunjhunu, under the "Karmabhoomi to
Matribhoomi Abhiyan."



Key Points:

- Union Minister of Jal Shakti C.R. Patil and Chief Minister Bhajan Lal Sharma participated in the program.
- The Chief Minister announced ₹1.25 crore for the "Kumbharam Water Project" (a lift canal of the Indira Gandhi Canal Project) in Shekhawati.
- Also, Anil Rungta, Chairman of the Rungta Group of Surat, was honored for his water conservation efforts in Jhunjhunu.
- The Rajasthan government has signed a Yamuna Water Agreement with the Haryana government for water supply in Shekhawati.

Other important points:

Karmabhoomi to Matribhoomi Abhiyan:

- The "Karmabhoomi to Matribhoomi Abhiyan" is inspired by Prime Minister Narendra Modi's "Catch the Rain" initiative to ensure public participation in water conservation.
- The program was launched on January 15, 2025, from Sanganer (Jaipur) by Union Minister of Jal Shakti C.R. Patil and Chief Minister Bhajan Lal Sharma.
- The main objective of this campaign is to save, conserve, and recharge every drop of rainwater and surface water for reuse through eco-friendly recharge shaft structures.
- Note: On August 11, 2025, the "Crop Insurance Claim Payment Program under the Pradhan Mantri Fasal Bima Yojana" was organized in Jhunjhunu.






IUCN World Conservation Congress, 2025

Why in News?

The IUCN World Conservation Congress is the world's largest gathering of conservation experts, policymakers, business leaders, and scientists, held to mobilize action for nature.



Key Points:

- IUCN holds an observer role at the United Nations and supports several international conservation treaties.
- **Event held:** October 9-15, 2025, in Abu Dhabi, United Arab Emirates (every four years).
- **Theme:** "Empowering Transformative Conservation."





- Objective: To set the global conservation agenda, strengthen environmental governance, address environmental challenges through nature-based solutions, and ensure equitable distribution of conservation responsibilities.
- **Host country:** United Arab Emirates.
- Participating countries: 140 countries.
 Key Points:
- Outlook 4, released at the IUCN Congress in Abu Dhabi, climate change has emerged as the biggest threat to the world's natural World Heritage sites, affecting nearly half of the sites. The report warns that 43 percent of natural sites now face severe climate-related risks, exceeding all other pressures combined, while invasive alien species are affecting 30 percent of sites. The number of sites affected by wildlife and plant diseases has also risen sharply, from 2 percent in 2020 to 9 percent by 2025.
- International Ranger Awards 2025: The IUCN World Commission on Protected Areas (WCPA) presented the International Ranger Awards 2025 to 13 rangers and ranger teams, recognizing their exceptional courage and dedication to nature conservation (with financial support ranging from US\$5,000 to 25,000).
- This year's recipients represent 13 countries, including Ukraine, Burkina Faso, and Saint Vincent and the Grenadines.
- New IUCN Member: Armenia has become the latest member of the International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN). The announcement, made during the IUCN World Conservation Congress in Abu Dhabi, underscores Armenia's growing commitment to advancing biodiversity conservation and sustainable development.

Parties (COP 29) to the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC), has stressed the need to strengthen climate finance and enhance cooperation among global environmental frameworks. He called for increasing climate finance for developing countries to at least \$1.3 trillion per year by 2035 under the Baku to Belem Roadmap.

Assessment in the context of India:

1. International recognition of Dugong Conservation Reserve: The International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN) officially recognized India's first Dugong Conservation Reserve at the World Conservation Congress 2025.

Dugong Conservation Reserve:

- Establishment: This is India's first Dugong Conservation Reserve, notified on September 21, 2022, by the Government of Tamil Nadu under the Wildlife Protection Act, 1972.
- It covers the northern Palk Bay area of Thanjavur and Pudukottai districts.
- Area: 448.34 square kilometers.
- 2. 'Guardians of the Wild' Report: It has been released by Union Minister of State for Environment, Forest and Climate Change, Kirti Vardhan Singh, in Abu Dhabi on October 11, 2025.
- 3. National Red List Roadmap and Vision 2025–2030:
- **■** Launched by: India
- It involves collaboration between IUCN, the Zoological Survey of India (ZSI), the Botanical Survey of India (BSI), and the Centre for Species Survival.
- The Red List, as a scientific document, will help India identify priorities and efficiently utilize resources. It will identify endangered species and ensure focused conservation efforts.





- Target to publish Red Data Books by 2030
- National Red Data Books: Under the Red List Roadmap, India aims to publish National Red Data Books by 2030. This process will be in line with IUCN's global standards and reflect India's commitment to the Convention on Biological Diversity (CBD) and the Kunming-Montreal Biodiversity Framework.
- India's Global Biodiversity Outlook: India is among the world's 17 megabiodiversity countries.
- **■** The country has four global biodiversity hotspots:
 - 1. Himalayas
 - 2. Western Ghats
 - 3. Indo-Burma
 - 4. Sundaland
- Despite occupying 2.4 percent of the world's land area, India supports 8 percent of the world's plant and 7.5 percent of its animal species.
- Of these, 28 percent of plants and 30 percent of animals are endemic.

IUCN World Conservation Congress:

- Scaling up resilient conservation efforts: Expand conservation efforts through science, traditional knowledge, and community empowerment to ensure biodiversity amid climate change.
- Reducing climate change risks: Implement aggressive emission reductions, adaptation strategies, and nature-based solutions to prevent irreversible environmental damage.
- Ensuring equity: Ensuring that conservation efforts are equitable, inclusive, and focused on indigenous peoples, women, youth, and local communities.





- Transition to nature-positive economies and societies: Shifting from extractive to regenerative economic models that restore ecosystems and sustain livelihoods.
- Disruptive Innovation and Leadership for Conservation: Challenging the status quo through bold, inclusive leadership, new technologies, and innovative governance models to bring about systemic change in conservation.

 History
- Previously, Congress was held after every two years, then after every three years, and now after every four years.
- Initially, Congress consisted solely of a meeting of all IUCN Member Organizations.

- In 1992, in light of growing environmental concerns, the United Nations granted IUCN official observer status.

Agenda for COP-30: Delhi Declaration



Why in News?

- Providing the agenda for the upcoming United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (COP-30), Delhi Declaration of the first ARISE Cities Forum, held in New Delhi on October 8 and 9, 2025, has emerged as a key outcome for driving local action on global climate goals.
 - Supreme decision-making body of UNFCCC
 - Meets every year (unless the Parties decide otherwise)
- Meets in Bonn, the Secretariat (unless a Party offers to host the session)
- First COP held in Berlin, Germany (1995)

Key Points:





First ARISE Cities Forum, 2025:

- **Event:** October 8 and 9, 2025
- ARISE stands for: Adaptive, Resilient, Innovative, and Sustainable and Equitable (ARISE) Development in Cities.
- Organizers: The forum was jointly organized by ICLEI South Asia and the National Institute of Urban Affairs (NIUA).
- Theme: '2025: From India to Belém'
- India will be the focus of this major urban resilience flagship forum of local governments in the South Asia region.
- It deliberated on the dimensions of sustainable urbanization, climate and energy, biodiversity and equity, from India's perspective, to cities in the Asia Pacific region and the Global South.

Delhi Declaration:

- This Declaration represents various developing countries through a shared call for strong multi-level cooperation and accelerated urban climate action.
- The Delhi Declaration was submitted to the President of the 30th United Nations Climate Change Conference in Belém, Brazil, as a collective statement of urban ambition, highlighting cities' leadership in advancing resilient, equitable, and sustainable climate action to address the impacts of climate change.
- This Declaration strengthens the long-standing advocacy of local governments and municipal administrations (LGMAs) for recognition of subnational contributions to climate change through revised national contribution to emission reductions (NDC 3.0), climate finance equity, and systematic inclusion of local priorities in global policy.




- The Declaration outlines shared commitments to guide local and sub-national governance in developing countries:
 - 1. Advance local climate action through innovative, scalable, and resourceintensive multi-level NDCs.
 - 2. Promote inclusive urban resilience by integrating adaptation, circularity, and nature-based solutions.
 - 3. Achieve net-zero emissions by removing or absorbing greenhouse gases released into the atmosphere and promote equitable and participatory green transitions.
 - 4. Empower citizens, women, youth, and communities in climate governance.
 - 5. Strengthen multi-level governance and transparent data systems.
 - 6. Mobilize climate finance resources and expand direct access for cities.
 - 7. Promote urban leadership in developing countries through cross-border and triangular cooperation.

Rogue Planet



Astronomers recently discovered a young rogue planet that is actively attracting and accreting matter from its surroundings.

Key Points:

- Definition: A rogue planet is a planetary body that has ejected from its parent system and is now freely moving in interstellar space.
- Orbit: Unlike normal planets, rogue planets do not orbit a star but instead move independently in space.
- Studying rogue planets helps understand the process of planet formation, the dynamics of planetary systems, and their interactions with interstellar matter.









Textile PLI Scheme



■ The Ministry of Textiles issued a notification regarding major amendments to the Production Linked Incentive (PLI) scheme for the textile sector.

Key Points:

■ Key amendments include expanding the scope of eligible products, reducing investment and turnover requirements, and more.

Production-Linked Incentive (PLI) Scheme for the Textile Sector:

- **Related Ministry: Ministry of Textiles.**
- Objective: To increase the production of man-made fibre (MMF) apparel and fabrics and technical textiles.
- **Duration:** From 2021 to 2030. The incentive will be provided for 5 years.
- Monitoring and Implementation: By an Empowered Group of Secretaries constituted by the DPIIT.

Pradhanmantri Dhan-Dhanya Krishi Yojana and Pulses Self-Reliance Mission

Why in News?

The Prime Minister launched the "Pradhanmantri Dhan-Dhanya Krishi Yojana" and the "Pulses Self-Reliance Mission" from the National Agricultural Science Complex, Pusa, New Delhi, and inaugurated and laid the foundation stone for over 1,100 projects in the Agriculture Infrastructure Fund, animal husbandry, fisheries, and food processing sectors.

Pulses Self-Reliance Mission:

- **Announcement:** Union Budget 2025-26
- Objective: To promote pulses production and self-sufficiency.
- **Timeframe:** 6 years (starting 2025-26).
- **■** Budget allocation: ₹1,000 crore.
- Goal: To eliminate India's dependence on imports to meet the country's pulses demand by 2029.

The scheme creates an integrated agricultural support system by integrating 36 schemes from 11 central ministries, including the Pradhan Mantri Kisan Samman Nidhi (cash transfer), Pradhan Mantri Fasal Bima Yojana (crop insurance), and Pradhan Mantri Krishi Sinchai Yojana (irrigation).

District Selection Criteria:

- Balanced Representation across States: The selection will take into account the ratio of net sown land and operational agricultural holdings in each State/Union Territory.
- Low Credit Distribution: Areas where farmers have limited access to financial resources, i.e., less than 30% of the district's total farmers have access to credit.
- Low Productivity: Districts with low agricultural production per hectare, i.e., districts with yields below the national average.
- Low Cropping Intensity: Districts with low crop diversity or inadequate annual crop rotations.
- At least one district from each State will be mandatorily selected to ensure regionally balanced development.

Implementation and Monitoring:

- PMDDKY is administered under the Ministry of Agriculture and Farmers Welfare.
- A District Dhan Dhanya Krishi Yojana (DDKY) Committee will be formed in each selected district, headed by the District Collector.
- This committee will be responsible for implementing the District Agriculture Development Plan (DADP).
- Coordination will involve the local administration, the Agriculture Department, and 100 appointed Central Nodal Officers (primarily at the Joint Secretary level) who will monitor the implementation and performance of the scheme.

- **Expected Outcomes:** The scheme will directly benefit approximately 1.7 million farmers across the country.
- Under the PM Dhan Dhanya Krishi Yojana, animal health campaigns will be launched at the local level, and an integrated dairy and animal feed plant will be established in Andhra Pradesh.





