Rajasthan International Folk Festival (JODHPUR RIFF) -2025



The Rajasthan International Folk Festival -2025, also known as Jodhpur RIFF, was held from October 2 to 6, 2025.



- **Event:** Held annually during the autumn full moon at Jodhpur's Mehrangarh Fort.
- Concept and Inception: Jodhpur RIFF was started in 2007 by Gaj Singh II, a member of the former royal family of Jodhpur.
- Organizer: Mehrangarh Museum Trust, Jodhpur.
- Objective: To provide a cultural platform to talented artists from Rajasthan.
- Historical Significance of the Festival: The festival is held annually at Mehrangarh Fort, which has been named 'Asia's Best Fort' by Time magazine.
- Key Partners for 2025: Creative Australia, the Italian Ministry of Foreign Affairs, and the Polish Institute, New Delhi.

Facts for Prelims:

- Folk Art: Folk art refers to art forms that originate among the masses and reflect the traditional life, cultural heritage, and customs of a society.
- These art forms are commonly practiced across all sections of society and are intended for entertainment, religious rituals, social occasions, and cultural expression.
- Major forms of folk art include dance, music, painting, crafts, handicrafts, colorful textiles, folk tales, and puppets.

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The country's largest tire recycling plant: Soniana (Chittorgarh)

Why in News?

Jaipur-based Regrip India Private Limited will set up the country's largest tire recycling plant in the Soniana Industrial Area of Chittorgarh.



Key Points:

- The plant was digitally inaugurated by Deputy Chief Minister Prem Chand Bairwa and actor Sunil Shetty from Jaipur.
- The plant will be able to recycle 180 tons of tires per day using the Indian technology of continuous pyrolysis.
- Annually, 54,000 tons of tires will be converted into carbon black, pyrolysis oil, and steel, reducing carbon emissions annually.
- Goal: The company aims to make India a tire-neutral country by 2035. Facts for Prelims:
- 3R in Industries: The 3R policy is adopted in industries to conserve resources, achieve energy efficiency, and protect the environment.
- Reduce Reducing the use of materials in production or consumption that contribute to waste or pollution.
- **Example:** Using less packaging material.
- Reuse Reusing an item instead of throwing it away.
- **■** Example: Reusing old tires, bottles, or cans.
- Recycle Recycling useless items or waste into useful products through processing.
- **Example:** Recycling plastic, paper, or metal into new items.

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ITI Bharatpur to be a hub under the PM-Setu scheme



■ Recently, the Industrial Training Institutes (ITIs) in Bharatpur, Rajasthan, were announced to be developed as hubs in the first phase of the PM-Setu scheme.



Key Points:

- Additionally, ITI Dholpur, ITI Karauli, ITI

 Kaman, and ITI Bayana are proposed to be upgraded as spoke institutes under this scheme.
- It is worth noting that the Rajasthan government submitted proposals for two proposed industry clusters under the pilot phase of the PM-Setu scheme (ITIs Upgradation). Cluster 1 includes Bharatpur, Dholpur, Karauli, Kaman (Deeg), and Bayana within the Bharatpur region.
- The main focus of this cluster to be established in Rajasthan will be on key sectors such as manufacturing, agriculture, and hospitality.
- Under the PM-Setu scheme, each hub will be connected to an average of four spoke institutes, equipped with state-of-the-art infrastructure, modern machinery, digital learning systems, and advanced trades.

Why in News?



Rajasthan Tourism Unit Policy (RTUP) - 2024

- Launch: December 4, 2024
- **Objective:** To increase the benefits payable to investors and entrepreneurs in Rajasthan tourism and to encourage the establishment of new tourism units in the private sector, thereby creating employment and entrepreneurship opportunities.
- This policy focuses primarily on providing exemptions for heritage hotels and properties, leveraging the benefits available to the private sector in heritage properties. Additionally, the tourism policy streamlines the licensing process for operating hotels, restaurants, and other tourism-related establishments.

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Sariska Tiger Reserve (Alwar) in the News

Why in News?


Recently, the government announced
 a moratorium on the 'Sariska Tiger
 Conservation Plan-2034'.

Key Points:

- Prior to the tiger conservation plan, the area of the Sariska Sanctuary will be re-demarcated. Additionally, the Critical Tiger Habitat (CTH) area will be mapped.
- It is worth noting that the Sariska
 Tiger Reserve's tiger conservation
 plan was prepared in 2014 for 10
 years. Over the past 10 years, the tiger
 reserve has seen an increase of 44 tigers.

Critical Tiger Habitat (CTH)

- Critical tiger habitat is notified by state governments under the Wildlife (Protection) Act, 1972.
- It is also known as the 'core area' of a tiger reserve. The largest area under Critical Tiger Habitat in India is the Nagarjunasagar region of the Srisailam Tiger Reserve.
- These are the fringe areas of national parks and sanctuaries. They are kept undisturbed for the purpose of tiger conservation without affecting the rights of flora and fauna.



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Sariska Tiger Reserve:

- Sariska Tiger Reserve is located in the Alwar district in the Aravalli Hills.
- It was declared a wildlife sanctuary in 1955. Later, in 1978, it was elevated to tiger reserve status and included in Project Tiger.
- It was elevated to national park status in 1982.
- It is the first sanctuary in the world to reintroduce tigers after local extinction in 2004.
- Flora: Sariska's vegetation is similar to tropical dry deciduous forests and northern tropical thorn forests.
- Kankanwadi Fort stands in the center of this reserve. It is believed that Mughal Emperor Aurangzeb imprisoned his brother Dara Shikoh in this fort during a power struggle.
- A famous temple of Lord Hanuman is located at Pandupol, a site associated with the Pandavas.

About the Tiger:

- Scientific name Panthera tigris.
- 75 percent of the world's tiger population is found in India.

Conservation Status:

- Listed in Schedule I of the Indian Wildlife (Protection) Act, 1972.
- Endangered in the International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN)

 Red List.
- Listed in Appendix I of the Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species of Wild Fauna and Flora (CITES).

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Dextromethorphan

Why in News?

■ The Rajasthan government has banned the distribution of dextromethorphan cough syrup.

Key Points:

- Dextromethorphan is an opioid cough suppressant, but it is not considered safe for children under 5 years of age.
- Concerns have also been raised about the presence of diethylene glycol and ethylene glycol in cough syrup.
- These are both colorless industrial chemicals commonly used in brake fluid, antifreeze, paint, plastics, and some household products.
- They are often used in place of the safer substance propylene glycol, a solvent that helps dissolve medicines in liquid form.

Swadeshi Campaign



■ The Ministry of Textiles launched the Swadeshi Campaign to boost domestic demand for handloom, handicraft, and textile products in the country.

Key Points:

Campaign Duration: 6 to 9 months across India.

Swadesi kapda, Desh ki Shaan,

Yahi hain Bharat ki Pehchan

- Campaign Slogan: "Swadeshi Fabric, Pride of the Country."

 The campaign aims and objectives are:
- Stimulating Domestic Demand: Increase domestic textile consumption, especially among urban youth and Gen-Z.
- Integrating Textile Heritage as a National Identity: Re-establish Indian textiles as a symbol of pride and style, especially among youth and urban consumers.





- Empowering Producers and MSMEs: Expand market access and income opportunities for weavers, artisans, and textile MSMEs.
- Aligning with Atmanirbhar Bharat: Integrating campaign efforts with initiatives such as PLI for the textile industry, PM MITRA Parks, and ODOP.
- **Encouraging institutional procurement:** Encouraging ministries, public sector undertakings, and educational institutions to adopt Indian-made fabrics for uniforms, furnishings, etc.

Other key points:

- India's textile and apparel market is projected to reach \$179 billion by 2024, growing at an average annual growth rate (AAGR) of over 7 percent.
- The domestic (HH) sector contributes 58 percent to the domestic market and is growing at a CAGR of 8.19 percent. Meanwhile, non-domestic consumption accounts for 21 percent of the domestic market and is growing at a CAGR of 6.79 percent.
- Domestic demand will grow at a CAGR of 9 to 10 per cent per annum and total domestic demand for textiles will reach US\$ 250 billion by 2030.



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Mud Volcano



■ India's only mud volcano has erupted after 20 years. It is located on Baratang Island (Andaman and Nicobar Islands).

Key Points:

Mud Volcano

- It is a physical formation that erupts a mixture of mud, water, and gases (mainly methane, sometimes carbon dioxide or nitrogen) on the Earth's surface. This creates cone-like formations that resemble volcanoes, but do not erupt hot lava.
- Mud volcanoes are typically found in areas where natural gas is present.
- Mud volcanoes are triggered by tectonic forces or the accumulation of hydrocarbon gases.



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Vande Mataram



■ The Central Government announced the nationwide celebration of the 150th anniversary of the national song, "Vande Mataram."

Key Points:

- Origin: It was composed in Sanskrit by Bankim Chandra Chatterjee and first published in the novel Anandamath (1882).
- On 24 January 1950, it was given equal status with the national anthem (Jana Gana Mana).
- 'Jana Gana Mana' was originally composed in Bengali by Rabindranath Tagore. On 24 January 1950, the Constituent Assembly adopted its Hindi version.
- It was sung by Rabindranath Tagore at the annual session of the Indian National Congress in 1896.

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NATO Pipeline System



■ Poland will now join the NATO Pipeline System.

Key Points:

- It was established during the Cold War to supply fuel to NATO forces.
- Purpose: It continues to ensure the supply and distribution of petroleum products for NATO operations today.
- Scope: The system spans 12 NATO countries, connecting storage depots, military airbases, civil airports, refineries, pumping stations, and truck/rail loading stations.



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Identification of Aspirational Agricultural Districts (AADs)

Why in News?

The Central Government has identified 100 Aspirational Agricultural Districts (AADs).

Key Points:

- These districts, located in 29 states and union territories, will be developed under the Pradhan Mantri Dhan-Dhanya Krishi Yojana.
- Aspirational Agricultural Districts (AADs) have been identified based on three key factors low productivity, low cropping intensity, and belowaverage access to credit.
- The government has appointed central nodal officers to oversee the implementation of the scheme in the selected districts.
- Committees will be formed at the district, state, and national levels for effective planning, implementation, and monitoring of the schemes.

Pradhan Mantri Dhan-Dhanya Krishi Yojana (PMDDKY)

- This scheme is inspired by NITI Aayog's Aspirational Districts Programme, which aims to develop the 112 most backward districts in the country.
- Scheme duration: 6 years (starting from 2025-26).
- Scheme convergence: The scheme will ensure full implementation-based convergence of 36 central schemes from 11 ministries in 100 agricultural districts.



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- Scope: The number of selected districts in each state/union territory will be based on the ratio of net cropped area to operational land holdings. At least one district will be selected from each state.
- District-level planning: A District Dhan-Dhanya Krishi Yojana (DDKY) committee will be formed in each selected district. It will be chaired by the District Collector or Gram Panchayat. This committee will prepare a plan for agriculture and allied activities in the district.
- Progress monitoring: The progress of each Dhan-Dhanya district will be tracked on a central monitoring dashboard through 117 key performance indicators.



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Tribal Village Vision 2030 Manifesto

Why in News?

■ Special Gram Sabhas were held in tribal-dominated villages across the country. The "Tribal Village Vision 2030 Manifesto" was adopted during these meetings.

Key Points:

- This manifesto was adopted as part of the Adi Karmayogi Abhiyan launched by the Ministry of Tribal Affairs.
- This manifesto focuses on community-led development and concrete goals related to education, health, livelihoods, social and financial inclusion, and infrastructure.
- The manifesto also proposes establishing "Adi Seva Kendras" in every village, which will serve as single-window service centers for citizens.



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ECONOMIC SCENARIO



Internationalization of the Rupee



The RBI has announced new measures to promote the internationalization of the Indian Rupee (INR).

Key Points:

Internationalization of the Rupee: The Indian Rupee will be able to be used for global trade and financial transactions.

Key Measures Announced

- Loans to Non-Residents in Indian Rupees: Authorized Dealer Banks in India and their overseas branches will be permitted to grant loans in Indian Rupees to residents of Bhutan, Nepal, and Sri Lanka, including banks.
- Establishing Transparent Reference Rates: Financial Benchmarks India Limited (FBIL) will develop transparent reference rates for the rupee against major global currencies.
- Expanding the Use of Special Rupee Vostro Accounts (SRVAs): SRVA balances can now be used to invest in corporate bonds and commercial papers.
- Previously, SRVA balances were only permitted to be invested in Central Government securities.
- An SRVA is an account opened by a foreign bank with an Indian bank to enable business transactions to be settled directly in Indian Rupees without converting the rupee into foreign currency.



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Stablecoins



The Finance Minister stated that innovations like stablecoins have transformed the landscape of money and capital flows.

Key Points:

Stablecoins: Stablecoins are cryptocurrencies pegged to stable assets, such as fiat currencies (the U.S. dollar), a basket of currencies, or precious metals. Significance:

- They are more stable than common cryptocurrencies (such as Bitcoin), reducing volatility.
- They are easier and faster to transact, especially for cross-border money movements.

Risks:

They can pose a threat to financial stability, and if many investors attempt to sell their stablecoins simultaneously, this could create a run risk.

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MILITARY EXERCISES 🗱

NATPOLREX-EXERCISE, 2025



- The Indian Coast Guard conducted the 10th edition of the national-level pollution response exercise "NATPOLREX-EXERCISE" off the coast of Chennai, Tamil Nadu, from October 5-6, 2025.
- The Indian Coast Guard (ICG) also held the 27th National Oil Spill Disaster Contingency Plan (NOSDCP) preparedness meeting.



Vessels maneuver containment boom to capture and concentrate spilled oil. Oil is then removed from the water's surface with a skimmer. Recovered oil is stored and disposed of.

- Oil is removed from the environment.
- Oil and water/debris must be stored.
- Resource intensive (vessels, people, equipment).

Chemical Dispersants



Chemicals are applied to the oil spill that break the slick into smaller droplets that mix into the water, avoiding contamination of areas like beaches or tide flats.

- + Oil removed from the surface of the water.
- Oil is not actually removed from the environment.
- Impact of oil spill is shifted to below the ocean surface.
- Dispersants themselves may be toxic.

In-Situ Burning



Vessels maneuver containment boom to contain and thicken the slick. Oil is then burned off the water's surface in a controlled fashion. Oil contained by ice may be able to be burned as well.

- + Oil removed from the surface of the water.
- Potential for air quality impacts due to smoke.
- Residue sinks if not collected and may be toxic.

Tracking & Surveillance



Spill observation and mapping via aircraft or marine vessel, tracking buoys, or infrared technology may be used to find the spill.

- + Critical for determining the extent and trajectory of an oil slick.
- Method and effectiveness can be very limited by visibility.

Shoreline Cleanup



Spilled oil which reaches the shore can be collected through a variety of methods, including spraying down with hoses, soaking up with absorbent materials or digging (manually or with heavy equipment).

- + Oil is removed from shoreline or displaced into the water for removal.
- Labor and time intensive.
- Impacts may have already occurred, or could be worsened.

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Key Points:

- Objective: This biennial flagship exercise was conducted with the aim of assessing and strengthening India's national preparedness to deal with marine oil spill incidents, as well as testing the effectiveness of coordination among various agencies under the NOSDCP framework.
- The exercise saw active participation from central ministries, coastal state governments, major ports, oil management agencies, and various maritime organizations.
- More than 100 national delegates and over 40 foreign observers from 32 countries also attended the event, demonstrating India's growing international relevance in the field of marine pollution control action.

Other Key Points:

- Oil Spill: This refers to the release of liquid petroleum hydrocarbons into the environment, especially oceans, rivers, or coastal waters, as a result of human activities.
- Sources and Impacts: Diesel, petroleum, crude oil, and other hydrocarbons can escape from sources such as tankers, offshore platforms, drilling rigs, or wells, having harmful effects on marine ecosystems, coastal livelihoods, and human health.

Solutions to Oil Spills:

Method	Description
Skimmers	Mechanical devices that collect oil from the water surface for safe disposal or recycling.
Sorbents	Materials that absorb or adsorb oil from water, particularly useful for small spills or residual oil after primary cleanup. Examples: Natural sorbents (straw, volcanic ash), synthetic (polyester-derived plastic shavings).

Dispersing Agents	Chemicals containing compounds or surfactants that break oil into small droplets. Mostly used to clean water bodies.	
Bioremediation Techniques	Use of bacteria such as Cycloclasticus, Oleispira, Paraperlucidibaca, and Thalassolituus zhongshania to eliminate contaminants.	
Containment Booms	Scientific booms or floating barriers used to prevent the spread of oil in the ocean. They also aid in quick removal and containment of the oil.	

Examples of oil spill incidents in India: Chennai (2023 and 2017), Sundarbans (2014), ONGC Uran (2013), Mumbai (2010).



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India-UK Exercise Konkan 2025



On October 5, 2025, the bilateral Exercise Konkan-2025 between the Indian Navy and the Royal Navy commenced off the west coast of India.



Key Points:

- Event: Being conducted off the west coast of India in two phases from October 5 to 12, 2025.
- Origin: This exercise has been conducted between the navies of the two countries every two years since 2004.
- This exercise exemplifies the comprehensive strategic partnership outlined in the India-UK Vision 2035, ensuring safe, open, and free seas.
- The participation of the UK Carrier Strike Group (UK CSG-25), led by HMM Prince of Wales, which also includes assets from Norway and Japan, makes this year's edition even more significant.
- The Indian Navy will be represented by the carrier battle group of indigenous aircraft carrier INS Vikrant along with other surface, sub-surface and air combat ships.

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Phase

Harbour Phase: Will include professional interactions, cross-deck visits, sports and cultural events exchanges between the naval personnel.

Sea Phase: Will include complex maritime operational exercises focusing on anti-air, anti-surface anti-submarine warfare. operations and flying other naval skills development.

- The Employees' Provident Fund Organization (EPFO) and the Employees' State Insurance Corporation (ESIC) have played a key role in increasing this coverage.

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




International Day of Non-Violence, 2025: October 2

Why in News?

■ October 2 is celebrated globally as Gandhi Jayanti and as the International Day of Non-Violence, declared by the United Nations.

Key Points:

- Following a resolution passed by the United Nations in June 2007 (introduced by then-Minister of State for External Affairs Anand Sharma), it is observed as International Day of Non-Violence worldwide. This resolution was supported by more than 140 countries at the United Nations.
- The resolution reaffirms the "universal relevance of the principle of non-violence" and "the desire to secure a culture of peace, tolerance, understanding, and non-violence."

Mahatma Gandhi's Philosophy of Non-Violence;

- Meaning of non-violence: "non-injury" or "compassion."
- It refers to complete non-violence in achieving social or political change, including no physical violence and no passive violence.

Other famous leaders inspired by Mahatma Gandhi's philosophy:


- Martin Luther King Jr.: He applied the philosophy of non-violence to the civil rights movement in the United States.
- Nelson Mandela: He applied the philosophy of non-violence to the struggle against apartheid in South Africa.

Gandhi worked extensively on sanitation, maternal health, education, gender equality, hunger eradication, and partnerships in development long before the formulation of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).




